MLA list of works cited

A list of works cited, which appears at the end of your paper, gives full publishing information for each of the sources you have cited in the paper. Start on a new page and title your list "Works Cited." Then list in alphabetical order all the sources that you have cited in the paper. Unless your instructor asks for them, sources not actually cited in the paper should not be given in this list, even if you have read them.

Alphabetize the list by last names of the authors (or editors); if a work has no author or editor, alphabetize by the first word of the title other than *a*, *an*, or *the*.

Do not indent the first line of each entry in the list of works cited but indent any additional lines five spaces. This technique highlights the names by which the list has been alphabetized.

The following models illustrate the forms that the Modern Language Association (MLA) recommends for works cited entries.
